



Welcome to our new Methodist Year! It's most surreal to acknowledge that I have been journeying with you for a year now, and can only thank you for your welcome and encouragement. Now my family has joined me in Malton, we hope to immerse ourselves more into the rhythms of Ryedale, building relationships outside our churches as well, which, of course, I encourage us all to do. Developing 'Good Soil' for the gospel continues to be a motif that God has placed on my heart for us. Seeking to balance our inner, devotional and spiritual life, with our outward ministry, care and engagement with our communities is one way to do so. Establishing and encouraging networks of relationships, forming community and deepening the conversations that we share is another. The District is currently appointing someone to offer training and leadership in Faith Rooted Community organising processes, which will help us find this balance, so we will try to secure an opportunity for a local course when we can.

With the grain harvest gathered in record time this year, our next quarter looks set to be similarly fruitful. With the circuit's support over the summer, the Wesley Centre aims to open its café doors by the end of the year and expand the range of concerts and events it hosts. I am hoping, with circuit approval, to put the flesh on the bones of some of the ideas we've been considering and will bring a proposal for a Pioneer Lay Worker to help us explore Outdoor Spirituality across the circuit. We give thanks for the service celebrating the coming together of the EAST churches of Ebberston, Allerston, Sinnington and Thornton-le-Dale as one Church Council body. We hope this will simplify and release some energy.

Looking to the future, the reality of more services than preachers remains a challenge, so please do consider alternative ways to meet, with or without a preacher. I know that people love their local churches and meeting one another weekly. Perhaps one way to achieve this is to form some Northumbrian Prayer groups, gathering primarily on Sunday mornings (say 9 am), before our usual services (but other times in the week would also work). These could utilise the Northumbrian Morning Prayer liturgy, with its pattern of meditations and short scriptures. They are very easy to lead, and include a time of open prayer. Methodist Morning Prayer could likewise be used, as it is at KMS. With a hot drink, and even cake afterwards and a time of pastoral conversation, they could offer a valuable local rhythm of worshipful gathering, even if the main service of the day follows in another church nearby. If you have already discovered new ideas that are equally fruitful (speak to Pickering about their café churches), then do share!

Lectionary Reflections SEPTEMBER 2025 from Roots on the Web

7 The cost of following Jesus Philemon 1-21

In his shortest and most personal letter, Paul writes to a slave-owning Christian, Philemon, on behalf of Onesimus, his runaway slave who has also become a Christian and is a valued helper to Paul. The letter is a challenge to Philemon to count the cost of following Jesus, either by taking Onesimus back or releasing him for Christ's service. This week we consider the cost of following Jesus in our daily lives and how doing so makes us stand out from the crowd.

When have you interceded on behalf of someone else? Paul was in prison, but out of love he intercedes on behalf of Onesimus. Where you see injustice, do you find ways of acting in love, for example by writing to your MP, collecting for a food bank or raising money for charity? Stepping out in this way means risking standing out from the crowd. If Philemon did take Onesimus back, if he freed him from slavery, this would have had lasting effects on his status in the community. How does the cost of following Jesus affect us in our daily lives?

14 Worth Finding Luke 15.1-10



Jesus tells two parables that explore the importance of searching, of not giving up on that which is lost: one about a shepherd searching for a lost sheep, the other about a woman who cleans her house until she finds a lost coin. Jesus' parables of the lost sheep and coins are a reminder to us that God never stops searching for those who are lost. These stories were told to religious people to challenge them about who they discounted. Have we become complacent and forgotten the call to love all people?

How does it feel when you find a lost, treasured item?

How did you find God - or God find you?

How can we show people in our community that they are precious to God, and to us?

21 Get Real! 1 Timothy 2.1-7

Timothy is urged to instruct the church in Ephesus to pray for all people, especially rulers and those in authority, so that all might live godly lives in peace. Paul reminds Timothy that Jesus is the one mediator between God and humankind, and that Paul was chosen to be the bearer of this good news to the Gentiles. 1 Timothy addresses Christians grappling with the issues of living faithfully for Christ in the world. On this United Nations International Day of Peace, he encourages prayer for everyone, especially for those in power and authority, that they may govern wisely so that everyone may live in peace. In the Gospel reading, Jesus points out that we need to be wise in our use of money.

How could you help others with the skills God has given you? What real life needs/issues will you bring to God in prayer today?

28 Treasuring Generosity 1 Timothy 6.6-19

The final chapter of Timothy focuses on where real contentment is to be found – not in the pursuit of worldly wealth but in godly living. True riches come from God and should be shared generously. Timothy is urged to treasure what will endure and, above all, to fight the good fight of faith. Today we are looking

at how we are God's treasure, and given gifts, skills and abilities to share with others. Are we generous in how we use them?

Contentment is not something our world strives for. In the western world, we live in a consumerist society, where we always want the next thing and can't rest until we have it. What areas in your life are there where you are satisfied? The Epistle reading today asks us to look to God for our contentment. God's generous nature gives us all we need. Our happiness is in all that God has generously provided, rather than the ever-changing gimmicks the world offers.

What qualities and characteristics do you treasure? How have you been generous this week? In what ways is your church a generous community?


